wo St. Philip High School classmates were mar-I ried on May 30th this year. Not unusual, you say? They were classmates in the graduating class of 1944. Now that's unusual!

Mary Lou (Dowd) Atha of California and Joseph Marriott of Colorado decided to come back to St. Philip Church in Battle Creek to celebrate their marriage, 65 years after graduating. After graduating 65 years ago, Lou and Joe went their separate ways. Each was married for 56 years. Each has been widowed. Each has four living children, and more grandchildren than anyone bothered to count.

A phone call connected them about 13 months ago, when Joe while visiting Battle Creek dropped in on the usual Wednesday evening gathering of the Class of '44 and decided to check on Lou at her California office. This led to several dates in California and a trip to Ireland and then the decision last December to marry. (Some of these seniors move quickly, even at age 83.)

The wedding Mass was lovely. Lou had her maid of honor and Joe had his best man (his brother) from their first marriage present again at St. Philip to reprise their roles, about 60 years after the prior

ceremonies. Most of the remaining members of the famous Class of 1944 were present. Many family members took an active role in the Mass. A priest Lou knew well from Ireland, Fr. Myles O'Reilly, SJ, came to preside at the Mass. He was assisted by Fr. Anthony Bitchapogu from India, by way of Kalamazoo, and myself. It was fitting that such a wedding would require three priests from three different continents.

A festive luncheon for about 90 guests was held in the St. Philip cafeteria, a relic from long before 1944. Two days later the bride and groom were to stop off for Joe's college reunion at Notre Dame before flying back to California, where Lou was planning to be "back to work" by the following week.

Yes, indeed, love is ever full of surprises.

Battle Creek Area Catholic Schools

Fr. Bob Creagan named BCACS Pastor Administrator

The Rev. Robert Creagan, the recently appointed pastor of St. Joseph Catholic Church, has been chosen to serve as pastor administrator of the Battle Creek Area Catholic Schools.

Bishop Paul Bradley, the new head of the Diocese of Kalamazoo, made the announcement to students at school Mass on Friday.

Creagan, 48, who grew up in Decatur, said he feels as if he is coming back home to Battle Creek. It was here that he attended seminary and was ordained in 1998. His first appointment was at St. Philip Catholic Church.

"Battle Creek became my second home," he said.

Bradley's decision to appoint Creagan head of the private school system was made on the recommendation of Creagan's fellow Battle Creek-area priests, Father Chuck Fischer of St. Philip Catholic Church and Father John Tran of St. Jerome Catholic Church, said Vicki Cessna, director of communications for the Diocese of Kalamazoo.

Creagan said he will continue what Rev. John Fleckenstein had done before him: He will be a

priestly presence at the school as well as pastor of St. Joseph Catholic Church.

"It just made sense to accept the appointment," Creagan said.

Fleckenstein became pastor of St. Catherine of Siena Catholic Church in Portage on Aug. 24.

He said he has known Creagan since before they were ordained and knows he is passionate about Catholic school education.

"He's a big supporter of Catholic schools and Catholic education," Fleckenstein said.

In a previous role as pastor of St. Charles Borromeo in Coldwater, Creagan said he helped reopen a Catholic elementary school in 1993 that had shuttered in 1969.

"In the midst of regular education we can share our faith and devote Catholic values, and having that daily with the young people," he said. "I have found already how receptive the young students are at all grade levels ... about their faith and learning."

STP Football Welcomes Another Hume at the Helm

There will be a Hume as the head coach of the St. Philip varsity football team again.

St. Philip announced it is naming John Hume as its new football coach. Hume, 44, is the son of longtime St. Philip football coach and athletic director Mike Hume, who was at the school for nearly 30 years until the early 1990s.

John Hume, a 1984 graduate of St. Philip, who played football under his dad, is excited about the opportunity to lead the program.

"As a graduate and after all the years my dad was with the school, it's an honor to be a

part of the program and to help continue the resurgence it has seen in recent years," Hume said.


St. Philip enjoyed an undefeated regular season last year and top 10 state ranking under then-coach Jay Carrigan. Carrigan stepped down after the season to become coach at Delton Kellogg.

It was one of the best

seasons St. Philip had experienced since the days when Mike Hume led the Tigers. Hume led St. Philip to an undefeated record and a state championship in 1985.

After his death in 1997, a street leading to the St. Philip football practice field was named in his honor - Mike Hume Way.

"By watching and playing for my dad, I've seen it done the way it is supposed to be done. I have a wonderful respect for how he got things done and he has always been my idol and my best friend when he was alive," Hume said.

perience as a member of the staff at Centreville for six seasons.

"John brings a lot of passion, pride and tradition to the program. John understands the St. Philip football tradition and also understands the challenges of coaching at a small school," St. Philip athletic director Vicky Groat said. "We are excited and looking forward to the 2009 football season."

Prior to last year's undefeated regular season, St. Philip went 2-16 the two years before that.

Hume is currently scheduling meetings with prospective football players and hopes to grow numbers and bring more consistency to the program.

"This program needs to become a program. You can't have just one season, you have to build over a number of years,"

Hume said.

"Last year was absolutely wonderful, but you have to build on that momentum. We want last year to be the expectation, not just something that happened."

The vibrant Campus Ministry Program at St. Philip High School takes students beyond the Theology classroom and into the practical life of Christian service.

We will get results! Meeting this **Challenge Pledge** will allow the construction of a new parish center and school cafeteria to begin as soon as the weather permits. Once completed, this nearly 9,700 square foot facility can accommodate up to 200 people.

The parish center will replace our old "Social Hall," a parish structure that is 100 years old and retrofitted to serve as the school cafeteria. Presently, the meal preparation equipment in the



social hall dates back to the 1960's. The bright, new parish center will house a commercial kitchen with ample storage space for a very active parish and school community.

Our ultimate plans are to close Cherry Street and develop a cohesive St. Philip campus.

These plans include coordinating design work for landscaping, greenscaping, lighting and expanded parking lots.

Thanks to the Class of

1951's generosity, we will also rebuild the Our Lady of Lourdes Grotto north of St. Philip Church. Gardens, patios, and ample outdoor gathering space will complement the grotto, providing a gorgeous opening to the new parish center.

There will be several upgrades to our high school building including a new main entrance, a full conference room, new locker rooms, and extensive main floor renovations. Joe and his wife, Carol, live in Battle Creek and are members of St. Philip Parish. They have three children: Stephanie of Anchorage, Alaska, Sara of Portage and Andrew, who lives in Los Angeles. They also have two grandchildren.

After 39 years of dedication to St. Philip High School and students, Joe retired at the end of the 2008-2009 school year. Joe is enjoying his retirement with activities such as cooking, playing with his grandchildren, enjoying the outdoors, and of course, reading

Jerry Reece, Class of 1958

Jerry is described by his fellow alumni as "always in his element with sports, whether that's as a player, in the broadcast booth, or when helping kids get their start."

Jerry won three varsity letters in both football and basketball. Jerry started on the 1955 state championship football team, a sophomore defensive end. He was an All-City football and basketball player his senior year.

His children, Kim, Mark, Mike and Kelly, all earned letters playing for St. Philip. He has two grandchildren who attend St. Philip and participate in athletics.

Jerry is also well-known for his sportscaster and commentator career for WELL radio, where he broadcast area athletic events and a Saturday coach's talk show. He also cofounded the Southern Michigan Sports Network, expanding his broadcasts even further.

Jerry worked in Michigan and California with several automotive manufacturing companies, including General Motors in Kalamazoo. He also launched his own business, Total Cleaning Solutions. He and his wife, Sandy are now retired.

Long Time STP Athletic Booster Dick will not be a stranger on the Hall of Fame ledger. His son, Fred Smith, Class of 1973, and daughter, Mary Jo (Smith) Jager, Class of 1977, were inducted in 2000 and 1995, respectively. Nor is Dick the only Smith being inducted this year. baseball. He was an Associated Press All-State center in 1974 when St. Philip posted a 9-0 record and claimed a mythical state championship.

Steve went on to play football for four years and graduated from Northwood University. He currently resides in New Port Richey, Florida and is employed by Rodeway Trucking. He has two children, Richard and Renee.



The Mystique of Rome...

him without that environment, but as they say "When in Rome."


