Coach Frank Niemann and the girls' squad ended their 2010 campaign with league, district and regional champion-


ships to go with a school record 25-1 finish.

#### BCACS Community answers the \$500,0000 Challenge

Monday, April 12, 2010, was an exciting day for every alumnus, alumna, student, faculty, parent and parishioner at St. Philip School and Parish and the Battle Creek Area Catholic Schools as we broke ground for our new parish center, school administrative offices and locker rooms.

The new 20,000 square addition is being made possible through the stewardship of the Battle Creek community and its donations to the In the Spirit of Community Capital Campaign.

This \$15 million campaign has generated nearly \$10.8 million towards its goal. The parish center, school offices and locker rooms are the next step in construction for the Spirit campaign which also includes the development of a cohesive parish and school campus.

Other projects already completed include the construction of a new rectory at the St. Philip campus, construction of locker rooms and concession stand at Walsh Field, renovation of the Tiger Den, construction of a new middle school at the St. Joseph campus and expansion of

the cafeteria and kitchen facilities at St. Joseph School.

As I am writing, our school is closed for the weekend while the asbestos in the halls and main floor bathrooms is abated. Beginning May 24th, Cherry Street will be blocked and excavation will begin.

During the summer months, concrete work, underground plumbing and electrical and masonry work will begin. By fall, the exterior shell will be complete including windows, doors, and roofing. This will be perfect timing for our "Hard Hat Tours" during the Homecoming Reunion!

The new locker rooms will be ready for our athletic teams during the basket-ball season. Our Lady of Lourdes Grotto will find its new home during the spring. Demolition of our old (and worn!) cafeteria will take place in April and allow for a new parking lot, landscaping and lighting.

If all goes as planned, you are cordially invited to attend the ribbon cutting and blessing of our new facility next spring! ITURE VISION

With all of its charm and character, our 100 year old classroom facility with its 50 year-old addition is costly to maintain. Consequently, the final phase of the In the Spirit of Community Capital Campaign focuses on renovating and equipping our classroom facilities to meet the needs of today's and future students. A grant received from the Binda Foundation funded the development of a "prototype" classroom, helping faculty to "test" technology, environment and equipment. Nearly, \$100,000 was invested to fully renovate this classroom, guiding the way for continued facility improvement. As funds become available, we will continue these renovations. Ultimately, the transformation of the high school fulfills the vision for Catholic education for the 21st Century.

## The Future is Now at STP

"This room feels like we are in a college.

"It seems more professional."

"It is calming."

"The technology is easy in here."

hese are some of the comments that students have made since being in the new prototype (model) classroom. Even before the room opened up for instruction, students were asking to see the room and had daily questions about different aspects of the construction. They were excited to be involved in a learning space that was different.

The vision behind the prototype classroom is twofold:

- 1. The room should be comfortable and convey a culture of engagement, discussion, and collaborative conversation.
- 2. The technology should easily and seamlessly integrate into student learning and teacher instruction.

With all new lighting, ceiling, windows and coverings, cabinetry, carpet, electrical (many more outlets!) and mechanical work, the



room definitely looks different than any of the others.

In addition to the physical changes, there are features to the room that support learning that is focused on the student rather than the teacher. For instance, there is one wall that is lined with white 'huddle' boards. These are sections of whiteboard that can be taken off the main board and carried to student tables. Here students can record ideas or brainstorm questions related to a particular topic. The boards can then be hung back up on the main wall, enabling groups to share information. It also allows ideas to 'sit' for a few class periods so that information can be added and new ideas shared.

The whiteboard on the other side of the room is ready to become an "interactive whiteboard". The newest version of the software will be installed within the next month or so. This will allow the teacher and the students to take full advantage of the wireless and laptop technology that has been such a part of our school for the past four vears.

The prototype room has become a showcase for visitors, alumni, and prospective families. It is giving our community a sense of the vision the BCACS community has for education and how St. Philip can evolve itself to meet the needs of a 21st century learner. Stop by to take a look!





## What being a teacher at STP teaches me

As an alumnus of the Class of 2000 and a teacher of four years at Saint Philip High School, I have the distinct privilege to write an article about the exciting changes that are occurring in our

high school. Who knew that construction could sound and look so sweet?

As I am getting ready to celebrate my ten-year class reunion, my peers and other alumni have often asked me if the high school has changed. My reply to them is, "The roof still leaks, the boiler still speaks, the locker rooms still reek, but we are starting to fix it in a few weeks."

Despite needing constant repairs, the people of Saint Philip have been the glue that has held this special place together. Being a teacher at Saint Philip High School has taught me that the strongest foundation of our schools is not in blueprints, but rather in the fact that we are built upon tradition, faith, and love.

I truly believe that there is a lot to be said about our students, faculty, families, alumni, parishioners, priests, community, and God's grace to have kept our alma mater standing for the past 93 years. When reflecting on the hardships that history has dealt our St. Philip, I am overcome with pride to be a part of something that is larger than myself.

On March 28, 1928 (on the heels of a Great Depression) the original Saint Philip Catholic Church burned down to the ground and the great people of this community were able to come together and start rebuilding in that same year. Today (on the heels of an economic recession) the "spirit of community" has come together to rebuild and renovate our Battle Creek Area Catholic Schools. The
