





#### JOHN WALKER, CLASS OF 1960

John was nominated by classmate, Patty (Bogosoff) Perry. Patty cited his long-term commitment and service with the Lions Club for his nomination as distinguished alumni.

Graduating high school with Honors, John was an honor student all four years. He played varsity football and earned All-State Honorable Mention in 1959. He played baseball for two years and was junior varsity basketball manager for four years. John shared, "The solid academic background and participation in athletics taught me the value of hard work, determination and goal setting."

Following high school, John earned his Associate of Arts Degree from Kellogg Community College. He graduated from Michigan State University with a Bachelor of Arts in Education. He holds a Master of Arts, School Administration from the University of Michigan and Educational Specialist, Curriculum Development from Michigan State University. John retired from teaching after a 35-year career. He last served as principal at St. Matthew School in the Archdiocese of Detroit.

John has been a member of the Sterling Heights Lions Club since 1982. He has held many offices within the association, including club president, council chair, zone chair, region chair, cabinet secretary/treasurer, and district governor. John was appointed to a two-year term as a director of The International Association of Lions Clubs in 2001. He was involved in the Lions Club International Campaign Sight First which raised \$1.8 million. He currently serves as U.S. Constitutional Area Leader of the Global Leadership Team. John and his wife, Karen, have two children, Michael and Jennifer and three grandchildren. They currently reside in Surprise, Arizona where they are both members of the Lions Club.

#### AL BELL, CLASS OF 1965

A l was nominated, collectively, by eleven of his classmates who shared, "Al is a man of integrity, compassion, love and devotion to family, friends, strangers, those in need, his community and his St. Philip Parish community."

Following high school, Al served in the U.S. Air Force, stationed in Okinawa for four years. While in the military he earned two associates degrees. Al graduated with High Honors with a Bachelor of Business Administration - Accounting from Davenport University in 1997...at the age of 50! He has held several positions in accounting and management including the Battle Creek Housing Commission, RW Snyder, Kellogg's and Pharmacia. Following God's call, Al was ordained a Deacon in 2002. He has served at St. Catherine of Siena in Kalamazoo and presently serves at St. Philip Church.

Al is on the Kalamazoo Diocese Finance Council, serves on the board of the BCACS Foundation, the St. Vincent DePaul Society and the St. Philip Parish Council. At St. Philip, he is a youth minister, lector and Eucharistic minister. He recently developed and coordinates a bi-weekly prayer group for parishioners.

Al's service to his community spans from restructuring the needs assessment process for St. Vincent DePaul, to developing the Thanksgiving Food Basket Program at St. Catherine of Siena, to coordinating a relief response between Battle Creek and the St. Vincent DePaul in Pensacola, Florida for those affected by Hurricane Ivan.

Al and his wife, Barbara, have five children, seven grandchildren and one great grandchild. They reside in Battle Creek.

#### VICKY GROAT, CLASS OF 1985

Vicky was nominated by Mary (Hunt) Rabbitt, Class of 1974. In her nomination Mary shared, "Vicky has given her all for St. Philip. During a very sad time in our school's history, Vicky stepped forward to help us to carry on. And, she is steadfast in her support for the students, staff and families. Vicky defines "St. Philip" and sets the example of "service" for today's students."

During high school, Vicky played on three state championship volleyball teams earning All-City in basketball and volleyball. Following high school, Vicky attended Kellogg Community College where she played basketball and volleyball. In 1989, Vicky graduated from Central Michigan University with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Business. Her career began at Behnke Trucking, eventually moving in to the retail management field.

Following her mother's tenure, Vicky became the St. Philip Varsity Volleyball Coach in 1998. Continuing as the head coach today, she has coached ten state championship teams, six state runners up and two district championship teams. (In all, St. Philip holds twenty state volleyball titles!)

Vicky served as the director of student services from 2006-2008. She accepted the position of athletic director in 2009 and continues to serve in that capacity. Vicky accepted the call to serve as interim principal at St. Philip Catholic Central High School in December 2014.

She is involved in numerous boards related to high school athletics in Michigan. She is the chairperson of the Michigan Volleyball Individual Academic All-State Selection Committee. Vicky also serves on the Michigan Volleyball Coaches Association and the Michigan Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association. Vicky was voted the 2015 Class D Volleyball Coach of the Year. In the 2015 Detroit Free Press "Best Coach of the Year" opinion poll, Vicky made it to the "Elite Eight," getting past Scotty Bowman (Red Wings) and John Beilein (University of Michigan) before losing to Mark Dantonio (Michigan State University).

Vicky is married to Mike Groat. They have one son, Blake, who graduated from St. Philip in 2015. They reside in Battle Creek.

#### TED FITZGERALD

Ted Fitzgerald graduated from Hastings High School in 1972. He competed in track (receiving four varsity letters), football (receiving two varsity letters) and basketball (also receiving two varsity letters). Ted was voted the Most Valuable Player for varsity football and basketball. He was the captain of his freshman, junior varsity and varsity football teams. Ted earned All-Conference Honors in both football and basketball and was named Hastings High School "Athlete of the Year" in 1972. During high school, he also served as president of the Varsity Club.

Following high school, Ted graduated with his Bachelor of Science Degree in Education from Western Michigan University. He devoted twenty-five years to teaching Health and Physical Education. Twenty-four of those years were at the Battle Creek Area Catholic Schools teaching at the elementary, middle and high school levels. While at BCACS he also coached freshman, junior varsity and varsity basketball for seventeen years. In 2002, he led the Tigers varsity basketball team to victory in the regional finals.

Active in volunteerism at St. Philip, the projects that Ted helped to accomplish include: renovation of the old boys' locker room, painting the gym and recapping of the old bleachers in the Tiger Den and maintenance at Walsh Field. Of course, Ted spent many a night volunteering at Bingo, as well!

Ted Fitzgerald was nominated by Ed Bauman and Marc Pessetti who expressed, "Ted is truly a Hall of Famer for St. Philip."

#### MIKE LEIFELD, CLASS OF 2003

During high school, Mike played football, basketball and baseball earning twelve varsity letters. During his senior year, Mike received All-State Honors in each of the three sports. In football, Mike set a career record for receptions, along with receiving yards and receiving touchdown records. Mike set St. Philip basketball career records in both scoring and steals. He was second for assists. In baseball, he had a .411 baseball batting average. Mike was awarded the U.S. Army National Scholar Award. Mike credits his coaches, teammates and especially his parents who guided him and supported his interest in athletics and encouraged his competitive drive.

Mike graduated from Kalamazoo College with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in English. His success in athletics continued throughout his college career. He was a 4-year starting shortstop on the Kalamazoo College Baseball Team and a 3-year starting wide receiver on the football team. Mike holds the record for the fourth most receptions in Kalamazoo College history.

Mike is a former writer for the Battle Creek Enquirer. He is a substitute teacher and tutor while continuing his employment with Firekeepers Casino. His athletic endeavors continue as a professional disc golfer.

# Finding 'hope' in Uganda

his past November my husband, Mark, and I had the opportunity travel throughout the country of Uganda for several weeks. We were there to visit with our good friend, Christine, who was working in Uganda with an organization called AKA Hope. Its mission is to support street children and orphans living in the slums of Uganda's capital city, Kampala. Since Mark and I are both alumni of St. Philip, we partnered with St. Philip students in the Interact Club, as well as the Rotary Club of Battle Creek. The Interact students were able to raise an incredible amount of school supplies that we packed in several giant duffle bags and took with us on the trip. During our trip, we spent a lot of time with the founder of the program, Claire, who is a native Ugandan. Claire grew up as an orphan. As a result, she truly has a passion for working to improve the lives of these children who are living in some of the worst situations in the country. The look on Claire's face when we presented her with the school supplies was priceless. She could not believe that young people from so far away cared so much about her organization and the children of Kampala.

We were able to visit one of the 'slum' neighborhoods of Kampala called Naguru where Claire and her counterparts have found children living on the streets. Many of them are refugees from Sudan, Congo, or other nearby countries experiencing conflicts or have left abusive homes. Claire is a social worker by training and has built a foster care-like system within the

Naguru community and was able to place these children in safe homes. The foster families do not receive any kind of compensation for taking care of the children in their homes, but they do it anyway. Visiting these families was one of the most emotionally difficult parts of the trip for me, but I am so glad that we had the opportunity to meet a few of those incredible people. Claire told us that about 30,000 people live in Naguru in terrible conditions, with no sewage system, electricity, or running water. The government of Uganda has announced that they will be demolishing this area by 2017. This prompted the need for AKA Hope to find a way to relocate the children and some of their guardians. They were able to purchase a building in the beautiful city of Fort Portal. As of February, they have moved all 84 children and 10 adult guardians nearly 200 miles away from Kamapala.



That was no easy task and I admired the dedication and passion that I saw from everyone involved with the project. AKA Hope is always in need of support as it is extremely expensive to care for the children as they receive no assistance from the government. # FROM CALHOUN COUNTY TO CENTRAL AMERICA

his summer, I journeyed to the country of Guatemala with a group L called Operation Groundswell, which is based out of Canada. Operation Groundswell, or OG for short, has a base site in Guatemala, but they travel all over the world including South Africa, India, and Peru, just to name a few. I signed on for the Extreme program, not quite knowing what I was going to get myself into, but I knew from my previous experience volunteering that there was no way to deny this kind of opportunity. In high school, I was one of several students from St. Phil to be chosen by the Hands On organization to travel to New Mexico to volunteer. That experience opened my eyes to how other people in our own country live, as well as people from other cultures. Throughout high school, I was required to volunteer both by the National Honor Society and the school of St. Philip. Twenty hours were required yearly. However, I repeatedly went over those hours while I was working Habitat for Humanity with my grandfather, serving food at the Kellogg Foundation on Christmas, and ringing bells during the holiday season for Salvation Army. I enjoyed these volunteer hours because they were spent with family and friends doing things that make a difference, not only in our lives, but the lives of those that are directly and indirectly impacted as well. Seeing that impact is not only a feeling of massive accomplishment, but you are also receiving a feeling of solidarity with your fellow man. Understanding the impact that your actions have upon other people is something that was instilled in me at home and in school thanks to St. Philip and my family.

Social groupings like St. Philip and my family are a privilege to have, however this is one of the few privileges that can be found in any community. I found this to be true in Guatemala, just as it was in New Mexico, and at home. The people of Guatemala put their families first, and I learned a great deal from them during my time there. In several different communities including Xela, La Paz, Lote Ocho, and throughout my trek in the Nebah area I was treated as another member of their family. Allowing strangers to stay in your home while they attempt to help your community is a very courageous thing to do. With little means of communication because of language barriers and lack of translators, the stay in the Mayan community of La Paz was eye opening to say the least. These people gave everything they had for us while we were there, receiving in return a small donation and our help creating a sustainable garden in their community center, as well as the privilege of participating in a few games of soccer with the gringos (us foreigners).

Being in Guatemala truly revealed to me the expansive nature of our world and humanity. Different areas of one country can reveal not only different scenery, but different people as well. I'm a changed man after this trip. Being exposed to the cultures and scenery has made me curious, as well as adventurous and I have gained a certain understanding of what it means to be a part of the human race, instead of the capitalist model of

the United States.

I have written several of my journal entries down on other websites. Those go more into depth as to the people I met, the places that I saw, and the things that we did.
