Our schools continue to tackle the greatest challenge and keep education at the forefront



Then we excitedly kicked off the 2019-2020 school year last fall, we had no inclination of what circumstances God would present to us within the final quarter of the year. As our community shut down, dedicated the and talented Battle Creek Area Catholic Schools staff acted swiftly to

ensure that all of our students not only had basic needs met at home but that they were able to continue their education through daily virtual instruction.

Without missing a step and with only a few hours' notice, BCACS staff implemented a virtual learning plan for students to work remotely until it was deemed safe to return to school. Staff led Zoom meetings, phone calls, and organized supply pick up and drop off to ensure that every student had the appropriate supports in place.

Along with the focus of continuity of education, supporting students' social and emotional well-being in a time of fear and uncertainty was also a priority. Middle School and High School staff and administrators personally delivered comfort packages to every student's home. Along with the treats, the familiar and friendly faces were a welcomed sight.

The 2019-2020 school year ended with our talented teachers continuing to instruct virtually.

As the summer months carried on, the plans for reopening the school took shape. The school administrators worked around the clock, coordinating with our clergy, the Diocese of Kalamazoo, and local and national health officials to create a comprehensive plan to ensure the safe return to our schools.

Confident in the rigorous protocols and processes that have been established, our BCACS students happily returned to our hallways mid-August of 2020. Currently, we are the only PreK-12th grade school system in our community with students attending in-person classes five days per week. The vigilance of the staff, along with our supportive community, have allowed for a safe and productive school year.



An Unprecedented Time

With many thanks to our thoughtful community, donors provided generous gifts to support these plans. The BCACS Foundation also actively pursued additional support, securing funds from the Battle Creek Community Foundation for the necessary supplies and equipment to safely reopen the schools.

These combined efforts and gifts have allowed us to:

- Provide each student with an electronic device, which will enable them to stay connected both inside and outside of the classroom
- Purchase in-classroom live streaming cameras and software that enables students that are unable to attend in-person learning to stay connected to daily instruction virtually while at home
- Purchase the essential protective gear and personal hygiene items for both staff and students to keep our environments safe for learning
- Provide new work stations for students to keep a safe distance while working in classrooms

Along with providing our standard top-notch academics, our teachers have also been tasked with maintaining their classrooms and ensure that students are mindful of the new safety procedures. These necessary efforts have doubled their responsibilities, but in their own words, the staff "Wouldn't have it any other way". We believe that our schools offers the most talented, dedicated staff but

through their efforts over this past year, we know that being part of our schools is not just a job to our educators, it is truly their calling.

Our parents have proven to be true partners with our schools as well, even when following protocols may be challenging and not aligning with their work duties and schedules. The combination of our school family's efforts and love for our schools is evident every single day.

While it has not been without challenges, the challenges were met with positivity. Our principals, used to wearing multiple hats throughout the building in normal circumstances, stretched their roles to become classroom instructors, janitors, and lunchroom assistants when the needs arose. Embracing the extra time to be with students, St. Joseph Elementary Principal Sara Myers shared "It is always a great opportunity to get back into the classroom doing what I love the most."

If there is one thing we are most certain of, it is that God has put the right people in place to successfully navigate one of our schools' most difficult periods, which has truly challenged our traditional mode of education. This combined effort with the staff, parents, alumni, and supportive donors is what has allowed us to continue providing academic and spiritual excellence at Battle Creek Area Catholic Schools

Please keep our schools and families in your prayers as we continue to work together through this unprecedented time.

talented staff. As we focused on the materials necessary to make this happen, the need for the replacement of the St. Joseph Schools roof remains a priority. As you may already be aware, last year we successfully raised enough funds to complete the first phase of this two-phased project. Due to delays and challenges with the pandemic in 2020, the construction for the replacement of this first portion of the roof is slated to begin in the summer of 2021.

In our commitment to being faithful stewards of the support we receive, we are always seeking every opportunity that allows us to practice this. We take seriously our responsibility to maximize your generosity and welcome opportunities of grants, matching campaigns, and in-kind support. For the second phase St. Joseph roof project, we are blessed to have secured a matching gift opportunity through Catholic Extension, an organization that offers support to Catholic parishes across the country.

With this gift through Catholic Extension, any new pledge or contribution to the St. Joseph Roof Campaign will be matched, up to \$40,000 from now through May



31, 2021. Unlike other matching opportunities we've received, if we are unable to raise the full \$40,000, we will not receive any of the matching funds. Currently, we have already secured just over half of the amount needed to receive these funds. A HISTORIC STATE TITLE

Winning A State Title Is No Easy Feat Just Ask The 2020 St. Philip Varsity Volleyball Team



Along-fought season which was paused due to the COVID-19 pandemic ended at Kellogg Arena in January, where the Fighting Tigers persevered for the program's 21st state championship.

The extended season tipped off by training outdoors on a beach volleyball court, and even after moving back into the gym, was marred with pandemic-related training restrictions and the added challenge of performing with a face covering.

Still, one of the most successful volleyball programs in the nation continued its winning ways, thanks in large part to a succession of student-athletes who long ago aspired to carry the torch and join an elite group of state champion volleyball players from the little Catholic school at 20 Cherry Street.

Year over year, after celebrating successful wins, it's common to hear St. Philip volleyball players to be quoted as saying that they remember being in the stands as elementary and middle school students as the volleyball teams marched on to the finals. That's no accident, as our victories are celebrated throughout our entire community. For all 20 state finals matches

before, you could easily find a contingent of starryeyed girls in the stands, eager for their chance to play.

That was another challenge of the 2020 season. With the Covid-19 concerns, access to the Final Four and State Finals was restricted to 50 tickets per team. The usual "sea of red" represented by the St. Philip fan section at Kellogg Arena was limited to mostly players' family members, while the typically loud and costume-clad student section was empty. Despite this limitation, the semifinal victory was live-streamed in every classroom and many families were able to watch the final match online as well.

However, the personal touch that undoubtedly left the biggest impression with our future players was the classroom visits from the team showing off their newest trophy and individual medals. From the looks on the young students' faces, we have no doubt that the St. Philip volleyball dynasty is not going anywhere.

From A Familiar Face



When Mary Rabbitt retired as secretary of St. Philip High School after over 30 years on the job in 2019, she promised to continue helping the schools however she could. It didn't take long for her to identify a need and take action.

For any longtime STP sports fan, seeing Mary at the admissions table, working the concessions stand, or monitoring the rowdy student section was a familiar sight. What not many people witnessed was the countless hours of work poured into helping prepare the gym before and after each athletic event over the years.

In Mary's final years as administrative assistant at St. Philip, she was able to witness the transformation and modernization of the Sheila Guerra Gymnasium, which has housed decades of memories and milestones. The one standing upgrade that has yet to happen is installing the mechanism to automatically raise and lower the 6

basketball hoops throughout the gym. Currently, this has to be done by hand for fans to enjoy an un-obstructed view of each match. Within a normal basketball season, this could be done over 100 times per basket. With an automated system, future staff would save more than half the time that Mary has helped put in to adjusting the hoops.


While Mary played a pivotal role in the operations of the school, her soft spot has been with athletics. Mary shared, "When visitors come to St. Philip for athletic events, I am so proud of what has been accomplished over the years. Not only with the improvements to the gym, but around the gym there are two new locker rooms, the permanent concession stand and new bathrooms. This part of the school is where visitors from around the area come for athletic contests and for me, it's a source of pride that they could see what we have accomplished."
